ADP Update

If you were not able to attend our African Development Project gathering on May 5, this report provides a summary of presentations by Bev Wann and Sharon Davie about their visits to Kenya in February. This includes recent information about two of the effective projects we help support.

Reminder: A matching challenge grant of \$3500 was announced on May 5. We need to reach this goal by July 31. Thanks to all who donated on May 5 or after, we have reached about half this goal. Donations of any size will count toward this match and will be much appreciated.

Summary of Presentation:

On May 5 Bev Wann reported on her February visit with the Rev. Peter Indalo, director of Oyani Christian Rural Services (OCRS) in western Kenya near Migori. Bev also spent time with Peter's son, Nelson, who plans to come to Piedmont Virginia Community College for the fall semester and will be hosted by members of ADP during his stay here.

OCRS serves the region in many ways and has many needs:

Schools:

Children without access to education have a bleak future. Peter stressed an urgent need for tuition for 10 orphans at the local Quaker School, where \$300 pays for a child in residence for a year. Bev showed pictures of these young people and their school.

Books:

There are no libraries in these areas and books are sorely needed for children of 3 to 18 years. We are seeking a channel for sending books.

Tree Planting:

Since 1985, trees planted by OCRS have grown to a full canopy of trees, but elsewhere the region is deforested. The present tree nursery of 300,000 seedlings, run by Janet, a forestry expert, has a capacity to produce a million trees. Peter's goal is to distribute trees across the region. Farmers with ten hectares will receive seedlings and set aside one hectare to grow them. They will also be trained in tree cultivation using crop-rotations and interplanting to fix nitrogen and fertilize and condition the soil. Seedlings of various native trees, including eucalyptus, are supplied by a tobacco company as payback for cutting down local forests for tobacco-curing. The trees will help control erosion and after a number of years can be used for making furniture or buildings. Fruit trees like mango and orange are also included the project, but farmers must buy these seedlings and will profit in future years from harvested fruit. ADP is partnering with others to find funding for this worthy and ambitious project through carbon offset companies.

Food and Water:

Other projects at OCRS are private tilapia fish ponds for income generation as well as family nutrition; water projects (partly funded in the past by ADP), especially piping gravity-fed streams, and cementing at the spouts; and oxen-powered land cultivation for men (a system introduced by OCRS some years ago and now imitated elsewhere; traditionally men farm only if animals are used).

Women's Groups:

Bev showed slides of several remarkable women who benefited from OCRS outreach years ago and have matured to be strong contributors to the economy, health, education, and social reconciliation work of the community.

Conference Center:

Seminars for the tree project will be held at Peter's attractive newly created conference center. The center is already being used for reconciliation gatherings between tribes, environmental awareness seminars, weddings, and other meetings. ADP helped fund the refurbishing of the original buildings. Peter urges ADP members to visit OCRS, promising a warm welcome, comfortable housing at the center, and a free excursion to the Masai Mara. December, January and July are especially good times to be there. (A group visit from ADP supporters sometime soon would be an important catalyst for the work of our organization.)

Visit to Kitui:

ADP's Sharon Davie also visited the Kitui Development Center (KDC), where Janet Mumo is the amazingly capable and energetic director. Sharon was the guest speaker on International Women's Day, when hundreds of women gathered with their Women's Empowerment Groups to celebrate their achievements. KDC promotes these groups and provides training in leadership and book-keeping. The poorest women learn to pool money for income-producing projects, and to get and pay back loans. They have been successful in demanding from the authorities schools for their village and interventions to stop cholera.

We saw an interview with Janet, who rejoiced that rains have finally come after years of drought, so they have more food. She thanked us for our support. Funding is needed for school fees, orphans' support, and a community water project.
